Luncheon/General Session I - Wed, February 22, 2012 (12:00 pm - 2:00 pm)

Belle S. Wheelan, Ph.D. President, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges



Dr. Wheelan currently serves as President of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges and is the first African American and the first woman to serve in this capacity. Her career spans over 30 years and includes the roles of faculty member, chief student services officer, campus provost, college president and Secretary of Education. In several of those roles she was the first African American and/or woman to serve in those capacities.

Dr. Wheelan received her Bachelor's degree from Trinity University in Texas (1972) with a double major in Psychology and Sociology; her Master's from Louisiana State University (1974) in Developmental Educational Psychology; and her Doctorate from the University of Texas at Austin (1984) in Educational Administration with a special concentration in community college leadership.

She has received numerous awards and recognition including four honorary degrees; the Distinguished Graduate Award from Trinity University (2002), and from the College of Education at

the University of Texas at Austin (1992); Washingtonian Magazine's 100 Most Powerful Women in Washington, DC (2001); the AAUW Woman of Distinction Award (2002); the Suanne Davis Roueche National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development's Distinguished Lecturer Award (2007); and the John E. Roueche National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development's International Leadership Award (2010).

She holds and has held membership in numerous local, state and national organizations including Rotary International; Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.; the American College Testing, Inc., board of directors; American Association of Community Colleges' board of directors; the Lumina Foundation for Education, board of directors; and the President's Round Table of the National Council on Black American Affairs.

Dr. Wheelan attributes her success to hard work, endurance, tenacity, and being in the right place at the right time. She recognizes that prayer and support from family and friends make anything possible.

Dr. Wheelan is the mother of an adult son named Reginald.

Trudy W. Banta, Ed.D.

Professor of Higher Education and Senior Advisor to the Chancellor for Academic Planning and Evaluation, Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis



Dr. Banta currently serves as professor of higher education and as senior advisor to the chancellor for academic planning and evaluation at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. She has developed and coordinated 22 national conferences and 15 international conferences on the topic of assessing quality in higher education. Recipient of nine national awards for her work, Dr. Banta has consulted with faculty and administrators in 47 states, Costa Rica, Japan, Puerto Rico, South Africa, and the United Arab Emirates on the topic of outcomes assessment and has given invited addresses on this topic at national conferences in Australia, Austria, England, Finland, Germany, Hong Kong, Japan, Lebanon, Malaysia, the Netherlands, Scotland, South Africa, Spain, and the United States.

Dr. Banta received her Bachelor's degree in Education (Biology and History in Secondary Education) and a Master's degree in Counseling from the University of Kentucky, and the Ed.D in Educational Psychology (Minors: Psychology and Educational Administration) from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Dr. Banta has written or edited 18 published volumes on assessment, contributed 28 chapters to other published works, and written more than 200 articles and reports. She is the founding editor of Assessment Update, a bi-monthly periodical published since 1989 by Jossey-Bass and winner of a national award for overall excellence in 2003.

Dr. Banta is the recipient of several special recognitions, the most recent of which are the Contribution to Knowledge Award of the American College Personnel Association (2011), the Sidney S. Suslow Award of the Association for Institutional Research for significant scholarly contributions to higher education (2003), the University of Kentucky Hall of Distinguished Alumni (2005), and the National Consortium for Continuous Improvement in Higher Education recognition for building a culture of evidence to improve learning at IUPUI (2008).

Dr. Banta has been appointed and served on numerous national advisory panels including the US Secretary of Education's Special Study Panel on Education Indicators (1989 – 1992), National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences panel on encouraging outstanding college teaching in science, math and engineering (1999 – 2001); and the Executive Committee of the National Postsecondary Education Cooperative of the National Center for Education Statistics (2001 – 2008). In 2009, Dr. Banta was appointed to the advisory board of the National Institute for Learning Outcomes Assessment and continues this service.

Title: IPEDS Data and Benchmarking: Supporting Decision Making and Institutional Effectiveness

This workshop will consist of two modules.

Module 1 is designed for participants with little to no experience in the area of conducting benchmarking studies or with the IPEDS Data Center. This module introduces the fundamentals of creating benchmarks to measure institutional effectiveness. The module provides an overview of the types of comparison groups that can be constructed using IPEDS data, with examples of appropriate use. Participants will use actual data from the IPEDS Surveys, including the IPEDS Data Feedback Report and Executive Peer Tool. Exercises and resources will demonstrate processes to establish key performance indicators and identify variables to refine comparison groups. Module 2 is designed for participants familiar with the concepts of benchmarking and building comparison groups, the IPEDS surveys, and the IPEDS Data Center. This module focuses on practical applications for using IPEDS data in an institutional effectiveness (accreditation) self-study. Participants will use IPEDS survey data to create a benchmarking study, discuss specific research questions, and identify the types of comparison groups and key performance indicators that could address each. Exercises will focus on using the IPEDS Data Center to extract and analyze data.

W2 Title: Integrating Qualitative Methods into Institutional Research

This workshop will highlight the importance of using qualitative research as part of a post-secondary research agenda and how it can be integrated and used by an institution's research department. Qualitative research can expand on quantitative data that is already gathered by institutions leading to in depth mixed methods studies. It can also stand alone, providing a different view point when it comes to areas such as grant development and evaluation, program studies, and interventions. Qualitative research allows institutional stakeholders ranging from students and faculty to staff and community members to have a more distinctive voice about different things that occur in the post-secondary institutions they work for, attend, and rely on.



W4 Title: National Student Clearinghouse StudentTracker

This workshop provides an overview of the StudentTracker service from the National Student Clearinghouse. Topics include a general overview of StudentTracker, how to choose the appropriate query option, how to read the aggregate report, a conceptual overview of how to work with the student unit-level data in the detail report, and a review of the new enrollment and degree variables that were added to the student-level detail report at the end of 2011 including the current data coverage for these new variables and suggestions for ways they could be used.

W5 Title: Building a Sustainable Knowledge Infrastructure to Support Student Success

Presenters will guide participants through the iterative process of conducting a student-success research project. We will cover data retrieval, validation, restructuring, statistical analysis, advanced modeling, and interpretation. Given the longitudinal nature of student persistence, we will highlight event-history models. We will emphasize the importance of using database and analytical codes (SQL, SPSS, SAS, R) and of keeping a documentation system for project efficiency and sustainability. The session will enhance institutional researchers' capacity to support evidence-based practices through ongoing studies that are quickly adapted to different questions and easily updated for new student cohorts.

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

The Developmental Education Program Survey (DEPS)

The Developmental Education Program Survey (DEPS) was designed to assess how developmental education is performed across the state. DEPS identifies differences in program structures and student support between higher education institutions. The DEPS covered the following components: Organization and Administration, Assessment and Placement, Academic Advising, Curriculum and Pedagogy, and Faculty Development. All Texas public two-year and four-year institutions participated in the DEPS. The survey has provided a wealth of information to the THECB and state institutions. The authors of the DEPS (Colby Stoever and Isaac Ortega) will present findings and give a history of the DEPS development and its impact.

A2 A Longitudinal Study of the Effects of Labor Supply on Wages in Texas

In any labor market, fewer available workers for an occupation usually result in higher wages. For example, doctors have higher wages than teachers because there are fewer of them available for the workforce. This longitudinal study focuses on the formal labor supply of college graduates in Texas from 2005-2010 and examines their post-exit employment and earnings over a five year period including a time of recession. This study is important for institutional researchers and administrators in determining which programs have the best post-exit labor market outcomes and in deciding which programs to cut during times of tight budgets.

Second, the evaluations of instructors who taught the same class in both an online and traditional format were examined to uncover any commonalities or differences.

Educational Persistence and Performance of First-Time Students in Three Minority-Serving Institutions: What Factors Matter at What Time?

Track: Statistical Modeling

First-time students at three Texas minority-serving institutions (MSIs) are studied to identify factors that explain academic persistence, performance, and baccalaureate attainment. We use event-history models to examine the effects of time and time-dependent factors on student persistence and binary logistic models to identify factors that explain baccalaureate attainment. Using multiple-regression models, we examine predictors of academic performance separately for students who depart and who graduate. Results presented for each study institution are discussed to connect research and institutional practices. This research is part of a Lumina-funded collaborative project to build institutional knowledge infrastructures at MSIs to support student-success practices.

R1 Graduate Certificate in Institutional Research through Florida State University

A template of the Richland College program reviews with explanatory documentation will be provided and presenters will facilitate a discussion of how IR offices lead or contribute to program review within a framework of continuous improvement. Survey research is commonly-used for gathering important information to assist in planning, program design, and policy decisions in higher education. One way to avoid these negative consequences is for institutions to carefully plan and implement their research considering timing, focus, and importance of results. Communicating results of the research and outcomes (e.g., policy or program changes) may also improve motivation and participation.

R11 How to actually apply the UAA Student Learning Progress Tracking Model to YOUR data: Nuts and Bolts

This presentation will help you determine how you might implement some variation of the University of Alaska at Anchorage Student Learning Progress Model at your institution. Applying this model to YOUR institution's data can be challenging, but with some compromises, it can provide an informative graphic representation of the longitudinal success of your students and your institution. The model tracks entering student cohorts for 10 years and categorizes each member every year in one of 6 categories. In addition, continuing students are measured for the proportion of courses they complete among courses attempted, and that population overall is rated on a scaled proportion of completers vs non-completers.

R12 Let's talk about SACS: The Role of IR in Reaffirmation Process



Implementing the Student Learning Progress

Model: Two Perspectives

Current accountability models depend on graduation rates from colleges and universities. However, this doesn't provide a complete picture of student success. The Student Learning Progress Model (SLPM), a tracking system that follows students for 10 years, provides another view by monitoring not only whether and when students graduate, but also their academic performance and enrollment history along the way. Two Texas institutions, Sam Houston State University and Houston Community College, were among 19 US institutions to pilot test the system in 2011. The presentation will demonstrate the models developed, address the challenges of implementation, and explain differences in implementation processes.

Following a recommendation from the American Psychological Association (Wilkerson & APA Task Force on Statistical Inference, 1999) researchers should at a minimum visually inspect their data sets for outliers, spurious, and/or missing values prior to conducting statistical analysis. For example, when conducting survey research, cases that exceed response parameters (i.e. values outside 1-5 on a Likert scale) or are missing values altogether can grossly impact reported means and/or tests of statistical significance between groups. This interactive session will demonstrate user-friendly methods for identifying potential outliers and managing missing cases in an effort to fortify analysis findings.

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

Omni Bayfront Area Map







Omni Bayfront Meeting Area Floor Plan
